The official veterinarian certifies for export that all pet birds covered under this health certificate were inspected by the examining veterinarian issuing the health certificate and:

- 1. The bird(s) is/are exported in accordance with the laws of the exporting country.
- 2. Examination of the bird(s) occurred within 30 days of US arrival and showed no evidence of communicable diseases of poultry.
- 3. The bird(s) were not vaccinated against Newcastle disease within 21 days of export to the United States.
- 4. The bird(s) were not vaccinated against any H5 or H7 subtype of avian influenza.
- 5. EITHER²: The bird(s) originated from the European Poultry Trade Region (EPTR)³ AND the bird(s) covered by this certificate does/do not originate from, or travel through, any zones within the EPTR that were restricted for outbreaks of Newcastle disease or highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in commercial poultry for the following period of time, whichever is later: 1) until the restrictions were lifted by the national competent authority (only applies if the restrictions were placed for Newcastle disease or HPAI in racing pigeons, backyard flocks or wild birds); or 2) 90 days after depopulation of all affected premises, followed by cleaning and disinfection of the last affected premises, in that zone.
 - OR²: The bird(s) originated from a non-EPTR country AND the bird(s) covered by this certificate does/do not originate from flocks nor had contact with any birds or poultry originating in a control zone established by state/provincial/federal animal health authorities due to outbreaks of Newcastle disease or HPAI in the previous 90 days.
- 6. Insofar as can be determined, the bird(s) were not exposed to any other communicable diseases of poultry during the 90 days immediately prior to export to the United States.
- 7. The bird(s) were placed in new or appropriately sanitized packing materials at the premise from which the export process began.
- 8. The shipment will not transit through any region where APHIS considers highly pathogenic avian influenza to exist.

The official veterinarian must endorse the examining veterinarian's signature OR the official veterinarian's signature and government seal may be used alone if the official veterinarian conducted the inspection.

GUIDANCE FOR COMPLETING THE VETERINARY HEALTH CERTIFICATE FOR THE EXPORT OF PET BIRDS TO THE UNITED STATES FROM COUNTRIES OTHER THAN CANADA

This document provides guidance to pet bird owners and to veterinarians authorized by the Competent Veterinary Authority of the exporting country (where the birds live prior to departure to the United States) to issue health certificates for export of pet birds to the United States. Pet birds must be accompanied by a valid export health certificate and an import permit from USDA, both issued within 30 days from the date of U.S. arrival. Model health certificates containing the required statements and attestations, as well as a summary of U.S. import requirements for pet birds, can be found on the USDA Pet Travel website (Bring a Pet Bird into the United States (usda.gov). This document follows the format of the model health certificates on the Pet Travel website, to assist in understanding the information required by USDA and completing the certificates.

Only shipments of five (5) or less birds may import as pet birds. Shipments of six (6) or more birds are considered commercial shipments and must use a different health certificate (see Importing Commercial Birds into the United States Importing Commercial Birds into the United States <a href="Importing Animal An

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Applicants do not need to complete both box 1 and box 2. Complete one or the other as defined in box 1 and box 2.

- Box 1. Consigner (shipper/owner): refers to the person who owns the bird(s) shipment and the person responsible for communication for the shipment. Provide name, address, country, and U.S. contact information such as telephone number and/or email address.
- Box 2. Receiver of shipment in the U.S.: Responsible for the shipment in lieu of the owner. Provide name, address, and U.S. contact information such as telephone number and/or email address.
- Box 3. Country of export: Country where the bird(s) immediately prior to export to the United States; the veterinary health certificate should be issued in the country of export.
- Box 4. Date of shipment: Date the bird(s) left the country of export.
- Box 5. Country of destination: United States of America
- Box 6. Destination State: The U.S. State where the bird(s) will reside after import requirements have been met.
- Box 7. Port of embarkation: Name of port where the bird(s) will exit the country of export.
- Box 8. Means of transport: Specify air, sea, or land.
- Box 9. Description of commodity: Pet bird(s).
- Box 10: Commodities intended use: Pet. [Imported for the personal pleasure of their owners and not intended for resale.]
- Box 11. Total number of shipping containers: Indicate the number of containers that hold birds.
- Box 12. Identification of birds: Provide the information in the table for each bird, including name and/or identification (microchip, leg band, or tattoo), species/breed, physical description (e.g., color), approximate age (months/years) and approximate weight in grams. Note: U.S.-origin pet birds weighing over 100 grams seeking the option of home (vs. Federal) quarantine must be identified by microchip, leg band, or tattoo. The individual identification of each bird must be listed on the certificate. Identification information for other pet birds is not required but may be provided. Importers with pet birds that are microchipped must provide a microchip reader to use to read the chip at the U.S. port of entry. More information on import quarantine is available on the APHIS Pet Bird webpage.

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Page 2 contains the health certifications / requirements for import of the pet bird(s) into the United States. Pet birds that do not meet these requirements are not eligible for importation. The pet bird(s) must be inspected, and Page 2 is completed by a veterinarian authorized to do so by the national Competent Veterinary Authority (CVA) of the exporting country. This could typically be an examining (private) veterinarian or a salaried (official) veterinarian of the CVA; however,

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in some countries, only an official CVA veterinarian is approved to complete health certificate documents. If an examining veterinarian completes the health certificate, it must be endorsed by an official CVA veterinarian (signature and stamp). The importer should contact the CVA of the exporting country to determine the specific requirements.
